Year 6 Curriculum Newsletter

Dear Parent / Carer

Welcome to a brand new school year – the last at Bushfield! We have already started to get to know your children in our new classes and they are settling into life in Year 6 well. We have an exciting Autumn Term planned for Year 6, during which our topic will be 'WW2'. You will have an opportunity to meet with your child's class teacher in September's parent consultation meetings, but if any issues arise in the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact school and arrange an appointment.

Subject Overviews

English

The first part of the half term will see children use their new learning on WW2 as a stimulus to write, especially focusing what it would have been like to experience the Blitz during the Battle of Britain, both from the point of view of civilians and RAF pilots. We will be writing to describe, persuade and entertain.

Maths

Initially, we will concentrate on reading, writing, ordering and comparing numbers up to 10,000,000 and determine the value of each digit. We will then apply this to solve number and practical problems. Following this, we will move on to a calculation focus where children will learn to solve addition and subtraction multi-step problems in contexts, deciding which operations and methods to use and why. We will also look at using estimation to check answers to calculations and determine, in the context of a problem, an appropriate degree of accuracy.

Science

The first part of the Autumn term will see us focus on the topic of 'Light' which will be linked to our WW2 theme through making periscopes.

Computing

We will build upon previous knowledge on coding by using the programme 'Scratch'. We will be looking at how to sequence events and create interactive algorithms.

History

The topic for the autumn is 'World War II'. During this topic, the children will learn about life on the home-front, especially for evacuees and the experience of the Blitz during the Battle of Britain. We will learn about the role of our local area in the war through finding out about Bletchley Park. We will end the topic with an enrichment afternoon to celebrate VE day in style with an opportunity to dress up and try ration book recipes.

Design Technology (DT)

Our focus of DT this half term will be sewing. Based on the WW2 approach of 'Make do and mend', the children will be designing and making their own pattern for a piece of clothing, before using their skills to assemble and decorate it.

PSHE

Building on previous units studied in Year 3, 4 and 5, we will look at relationships – in particular, family relationships. We also look at understanding what a stereotype is and how to identify gender stereotyping. Finally, we look at understanding the term 'consent' in the context of social media.

PE & Games

Children will have the opportunity to develop co-ordination abilities and skills in a range of competitive and racquet sports this half term including badminton, basketball and handball.

PE Kit Reminder: Children are to come in wearing their PE kit on the days when they have PE (Tuesdays and Fridays).

Music

Linking to WW2, we will look at the role of music, for example, Glenn Miller. We will learn specific musical vocabulary to be able to describe music and instruments. After half term, we will look at music as a characterisation tool by linking our work to a traditional tale structure—Peter and the Wolf. We will look at composition and how an orchestra can be used to build certain feelings and effects.

French

The first half term will focus on learning vocabulary to describe the weather on a particular day and making a simple weather forecast. The second half term we will learn clothing words and link to weather to re-construct the story of “Quel temps fait-il, Berthe?”.

Assessment

At the end of the term, the children will complete a set of assessment papers, which includes maths, reading, grammar, spelling and writing assessments. We use the results to inform our planning and to identify children who need additional support. We also report the results to you at Parents’ Evening in spring so you can see the progress your child is making.

Homework

Reading

We ask that children are listened to while they read for about 10 minutes a day. They have an appropriate reading book given to them by the school but they could also choose to read a book from home or the library. Please support them by recording their reading in their organisers.

Maths

The children should practise their times tables regularly throughout the week (equating to 10 minutes per day). They can use the website www.trockstars.com.

Spellings

The children will still receive new spellings on a Monday which will be stuck in their log books. They should regularly practise them throughout the week and can use www.edshed.com to access games.

Topic

This term your child will be set a homework linked to our learning across the curriculum. Thank you for your support with this. Further details will follow.

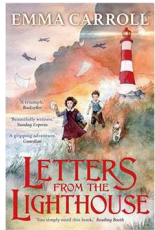

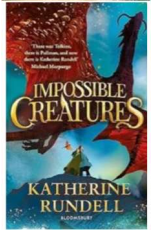

Suggested Books – a range of fiction and non-fiction linked to the topics and themes of the half term should your child wish to read further or need inspiration on what to read next!



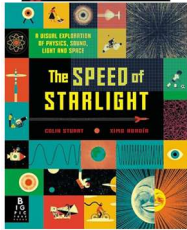
This highly recommended chapter book is an excellent text for encapsulating experiences of World War II from the viewpoint of children. It tells the moving story of Olive and her brother Cliff as they leave the heavily bombed streets of London and become evacuees on the coast of Devon, sent to live with an enigmatic lighthouse keeper. Soon Olive finds herself caught up in a dark mystery linking the disappearance of her sister with a strangely coded message.



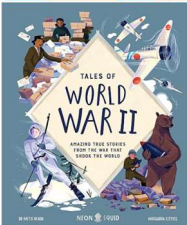
Full of adventure, mythical creatures and character growth, the story follows a boy's adventures when he discovers a cluster of magical islands on which all sorts of mythical creatures are really alive. He teams up with a local girl on a magical quest to save the islands. Katherine Rundell is a fabulous writer for Year 6s and with her repertoire of books, there will be plenty more books to delve into throughout the year!



Similar in theme to our reading text for the half term, this is a multi-award-winning story about the incredible friendship between a young boy and a silverback gorilla in the Second World War, inspired by a true story.

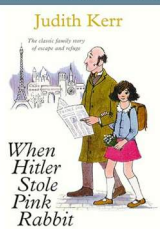
